# Goldstone Church Small Group Questions Acts 9:10-19

## For Starting

- Imagine living in a world where talking to another person was not allowed. What do you think that would that look like?
- > What do you think are the qualities that make a good friend?
- > How often do you think about Prayer?
- Do you think that Christians are required to pray? Why? See 1 Samuel 12:23; 1 Thessalonians 5:17; Luke 18:1.
- > What word or phrase stands out when you read this passage?

### For Reviewing

- > Where was Ananias when God spoke to him (v.10)?
- > Who did God tell Ananias to see (v.11)? What was he doing?
- > How would the man know that Ananias was God-sent (v.12)?
- > Describe how Ananias responded to God (v.13-14).
- > For what task/s had God chosen the man to do (v.15-16)?
- > Where did Ananias go (v.17)? What did he do?
- > What happened to the man that Ananias prayed for (v.18a)?
- > What did the man do next (v.18b-19)?

#### For Discussion

- "The hunted do not usually minister to the hunter". What does this tell us of Ananias' personal relationship with God? What do you think was going through Ananias' mind as he met Paul?
- In what way/s is Ananias' behaviour an "act of faith"? Did it help that God had spoken to Ananias through a vision?
- How would you feel if God wanted you to meet with someone known for killing Christians? Would you do it? Why, or why not?
- Do you think Ananias was a role model for Saul? Is he a role model for Christians today?
- God said, "I will show him how much he must suffer for my name." (v.16). Why do you think God said this? Does it apply today?
- "Fear turned to compassion as Ananias laid his hand on Saul and said, 'Brother Saul.'" Do you agree/disagree? Why, or why not?
- Following Saul's sight being restored, he was baptised without delay. What part does baptism play in the life of Christians today?
- > You could end by reading together Acts 9:11.

#### Acts 9:10-19 (NIVUK)

<sup>10</sup> In Damascus there was a disciple named Ananias. The Lord called to him in a vision, "Ananias!"

"Yes, Lord," he answered.

<sup>11</sup> The Lord told him, "Go to the house of Judas on Straight Street and ask for a man from Tarsus named Saul, for he is praying. <sup>12</sup> In a vision he has seen a man named Ananias come and place his hands on him to restore his sight."

<sup>13</sup> "Lord," Ananias answered, "I have heard many reports about this man and all the harm he has done to your holy people in Jerusalem. <sup>14</sup> And he has come here with authority from the chief priests to arrest all who call on your name."

<sup>15</sup> But the Lord said to Ananias, "Go! This man is my chosen instrument to proclaim my name to the Gentiles and their kings and to the people of Israel. <sup>16</sup> I will show him how much he must suffer for my name."

<sup>17</sup> Then Ananias went to the house and entered it. Placing his hands on Saul, he said, "Brother Saul, the Lord – Jesus, who

appeared to you on the road as you were coming here – has sent me so that you may see again and be filled with the Holy Spirit." <sup>18</sup> Immediately, something like scales fell from Saul's eyes, and he could see again. He got up and was baptised, <sup>19</sup> and after taking some food, he regained his strength.
